Dear Mr. Coleman:

I'm writing to update you on the arrangements for the spring conference on sexual orientation and the law. We have arranged the conference to run from 3:00 Saturday afternoon through 5:00 Sunday afternoon. Both Saturday and Sunday afternoon will consist of plenary sessions. Sunday morning, in contrast, will be devoted to four concurrent panels/discussion groups, each dealing with a separate area of the law.

We would like you to present a talk on "The Use of Law Students in Gay-Related Community Projects," as part of the Sunday afternoon panel on the "Law School Experience." In addition, we would like you to participate in the Sunday morning panel/discussion group on integrating family law issues into the law school curriculum. Dorothy McCarrick (CUNY Law), Bill Rubenstein (ACLU), Katherine Triantafillou (Boston attorney), and Nancy Polikoff (American Law) will also participate in the Sunday morning group. You might want to contact them to coordinate your topics.

We have blocked out 2-1/2 hours for each of the Sunday morning groups. The beginning of the session will consist of a series of presentations. Following the presentations, we would like all of the speakers to lead a discussion. In order to avoid turning the discussion into merely a question and answer session, in which the panelists respond to questions from the audience, we encourage you to come up with a list of your own questions to present to the other people present, or to devise other means of expanding the focus of the discussion beyond the issues raised by the panelists.

I'll be in touch again in a few weeks concerning funding. If it is impossible for you or your organization to finance your

travel expenses, we will be able to provide at least some money; if everything works out with our funding sources, we should be able to reimburse panelists for their entire airfare.
